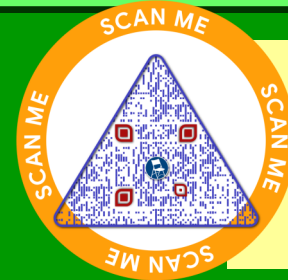

Working Step 3 in Alcoholics Anonymous

Can you believe it? It's March, and we're already 3 months into 2024, so it's time to take a look at the 3rd step in AA's 12 Steps of Recovery: *Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God, as we understood Him.*

Maybe the most important thing to understand about the 3rd step of recovery, is that while the first 2 steps are about reflection, the 3rd step calls for action. Some common questions about this step include:

- How does AA's 3rd step work?
- How do I practice AA's Step 3?
- What are some alternatives to God for Step 3?
- Can I practice Step 3 if I don't believe in God?

Everyone brings something different to this step. Some will have had a religious upbringing that was unfulfilling or negative. Others place themselves into an agnostic or atheist category. Opinions can range from "open but confused," to "staunchly opposed." For those that balk at the "God" part of this step, here are some alternatives to God to try on:

Group of Drunks (GOD)

Bring your fears, questions, and all the rest of it to the rooms, the fellowship, and the experience you share with your fellow alcoholics and addicts. Many people in

recovery describe their spiritual relationship as one where they ask their higher power for help, and then receive that help from other people.

Good Orderly Direction (GOD)

Consider the natural order of nature, and try trusting in the examples of balance and order observable all around you. Look for proof in nature, science, and math to find elements of purpose and order in the universe, and see if that is enough to put some trust into the idea that you are right where you are supposed to be.

Nature

Many people report finding that a lot of peace, comfort, and spiritual recharging happens when they interact with nature. This can be a walk in the woods, time in the garden, or watching ocean waves lap the shoreline.

Something Borrowed

Much the same way you might check out a book from the library or borrow a cup of sugar from a neighbor, many newcomers will borrow a Higher Power or investigate other forms of spirituality. The result can be creating a Higher Power and spiritual practice that incorporates elements cobbled together from different sources. Step 3 says God can mean whatever you want it to mean, and you are free to build and evolve that idea as you go. All that is required is an open mind and willingness to try.

Next, we come to the part about turning over our will. What does it mean? The act can be broken down into four parts:

Asking for Help

Surrender ego, ask for help whenever you need it, or whenever the path to recovery becomes too much.

Learning to Pray

Prayer here doesn't have to be seen in a traditional sense. Once you've identified your higher power, have a conversation with it, in whatever form that might take. Ask questions, or express gratitude.

Learning to Meditate

Take time every day to reflect on what has been, what is now, and what the future could hold.

Practicing Acceptance

Surrender control, and take your life as it comes, while learning to focus on what you can really control. At its core, step 3 tells us to get out of our own way, to understand, and turn over our will to whatever power it will take to get us into recovery. It's about admitting we need a power beyond ourselves to beat alcohol addiction.

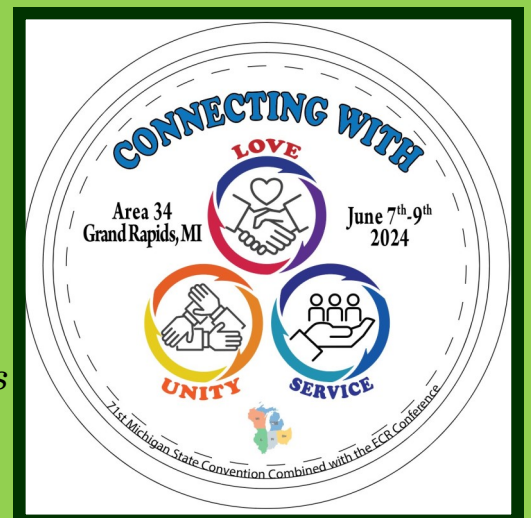

MEETING GUIDE, a service of A.A. World Services, Inc., is a free-of-charge meeting finder app. The app helps people find A.A. meetings and resources near them. A.A. service entities provide the meeting data for the app. Meeting Guide is available for iOS and Android smartphones.

Meeting Guide syncs with area, district, intergroup/central offices, and international general service office websites, relaying meeting information from more than 400 A.A. service entities directly to the app. Over 100,000 weekly meetings are currently listed, and the information is refreshed twice daily.

You can access and download Meeting Guide using the QR Code on page one of this newsletter. To add new local group meeting locations and schedules, or to update existing meeting information, please contact Steve at the Kent County Central Office at 616-913-9216. In addition, new local groups will need to contact the Registrar in their appropriate district to get the group officially listed with the General Service Office in New York, and assigned a group number.

Meeting Guide features:

-  A listing of both in-person and online meetings
-  A default view that provides a list of meetings, showing time, location and meeting name
-  A meeting detail view that offers extra info, such as meeting format and any notes provided by the group
-  A search function to find meetings by location or keyword

Thank you, Brian, for sharing your story! (Read on . . .)

I enjoy AA because each story I hear is special to the person, yet the stories all have the same theme of the effects of alcohol on our lives. I hear parts of my story in others, and I can relate to both the things I did and, thankfully, the things I did not do. No matter what a person's experience with drinking, I can see the devastating effects it had on their life as a reminder of the impact alcohol had on mine. Three things come most clearly to mind as I journey the path of recovery:

One, we are all alcoholic and alcohol does not discriminate. Regardless of social status, gender, ethnicity, creed, sexuality, or a myriad of other identifiers used in society today, alcohol has the power to take anything and everything from those affected, and the lives of those that we alcoholics come across. I am someone who did not "lose everything"; I never lost my license or even dealt with law enforcement, did not lose my home, family, or career. Yet, I lost respect for everyone in my life, including God, and myself, even though I was the cause of most of the problems. I have seen people in recovery that gained great standing in society, starting from nothing, and I have watched wealthy to-do's walk the path of destruction all the way to the grave. Everyone has a choice when recovery becomes an option in their life. I will be eternally grateful that my identifiers make me no better or worse than anyone else at the tables—just a grateful drunk, given the opportunity to live again.

Two, I signed up for sobriety and received a better life. When introduced to recovery and AA, I was looking for a path to stay sober. Sobriety is the most important part of my life. What I received was so much more. I obtained through AA a manner of living which is infinitely greater than the life I could have ever imagined. AA did not instill into me a moral code, rather, it taught me how to live the moral code that was already inside me. Everything of value or virtue was taught me by my family, faith, and life experiences. But with alcohol in my life, anything was on the table to forfeit as long as I kept drinking. Right and wrong was negotiable to ensure intoxication. Today, I live my values because the program of AA teaches me how to keep sobriety and the next right thing firmly at the forefront of my mind. Like all people, I have days good and bad. That is life. Human nature causes days glorious and days most painful. With AA, I can accept good and bad without compromising right and wrong in favor of another drink. I signed up for sobriety, and I received a better life.

Third, I was shy and my social network included a half dozen drinking buddies. I do not think my family was even really a part of my life, as the last days of consumption caused me to sacrifice every important event, recital, birthday, holiday, and so much more, to keep drinking. Today, I have a host of friends; true friends that I met through service back to recovery. I take my story into district and area meetings. I carry the message to detox facilities, and even a couple of times at a corrections facility. I have replaced the few phone numbers of fellow drunks with hundreds of contacts in AA. In service, I am reminded of my story. When I hear the pain of the newcomer, or the experience of the long-sober old-timer, I know that drinking is not making anyone's life better, and that I can stay sober, at least for today. I know it, because by the miracle of AA in my life today, I look into the eyes of a sober man each morning in the mirror. Reflected back at me is something I lost in alcohol. Reflected back at me is something I regained in AA. Myself.
